
JABC'S STRATEGIC PLAN AND PRIORITIES

JABC launched the Bright Futures for all B.C.'s Youth Strategic Plan in 2019. But the world has changed since then, and so has JABC. We are facing a future more digital than ever, with learning experiences that go beyond traditional classrooms. We are also looking at a future where young people must be more adaptable and resilient than ever before. Today's youth have to be prepared for an age of ongoing technological, environmental, societal and economic change.

Because of this new landscape, JABC refreshed its plan in 2021. The roadmap includes four updated priorities and two new transformational initiatives that will allow us to achieve our goal: to deliver 2,025 work readiness, financial health and entrepreneurship programs annually to B.C. youth in urban, rural and Indigenous communities by 2025.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY ONE

DELIVER RELEVANT AND ACCESSIBLE PROGRAMS



JABC TECHWORKS

This past school year marked the sixth annual JABC TechWorks, JABC's capstone work-readiness experience for high school students. JABC TechWorks is a forum for youth to explore tech-related careers and understand the education, skills and mindset required to ensure they are tech-enabled for the jobs of the future.

In the 2021-22 school year, over 5,500 youth in urban, rural and Indigenous communities across B.C. participated online in JABC TechWorks. DISCOVERY FOUNDATION'S DISCOVER YOUR PITCH

JABC was pleased to host the fourth annual Discover your Pitch in the spring of 2022. Held in person for the first time in two years, this exclusive competition is a chance for B.C. high school students to pitch their ideas to panel of senior business leaders for cash prizes. PROGRAMS FOR INDIGENOUS LEARNERS

Indigenous youth is one of B.C.'s fastest-growing populations and JABC has been steadily increasing its focus on Indigenous schools and communities to create meaningful relationships that support access to JA programs.

These programs aim to promote a culture of positive financial health for Indigenous learners and emphasize goal setting, informed financial decision-making and planning for the future.

On June 2, 2022, JABC hosted a World of Choices program that focused on Indigenous businesses.



Close to 1,500 Grade 6-12 students joined the virtual program and heard Indigenous leaders, entrepreneurs, and role models talk about their career journeys. Students also participated in an engaging Q&A session with the presenters.



VOLUNTEERS: THE HEART OF JA



JABC relies on a team of generous volunteers who donate their time to deliver relevant and accessible programs to B.C. youth. During the 2021-2022 school year, 367 volunteers shared their knowledge both online and in person as volunteers were enthusiastically welcomed back into classrooms after a period of online-only deliveries.



TRANSFORMATIONAL INITIATIVE ONE TECHNOLOGY AND INFRASTRUCTURE



Like many businesses around the world, the pandemic accelerated JABC's digital transformation. Our program offerings, like JABC TechWorks and World of Choices, have been elevated to online platforms and now reach new participants province-wide.

Internally, we began the process of transitioning our customer relationship management system to Salesforce in order to improve community engagement and marketing capabilities.

ELEVATING OUR PROGRAMS: WORLD OF CHOICES MONTHLY SERIES

JABC launched the JA World of Choices multiclass monthly series during the 2021-22 school year. Exploring careers in different industries each month, the 80-minute virtual workreadiness program reaches students all across the province in grades 6-12 and features guest speakers, a Q&A between students and speakers, and trivia questions.

- Working closely with organizations such as Take a Hike, Thrive for Blacks, Island Crisis Care Society and Threshold Society to provide more customized programming for at-risk or vulnerable populations, people of colour and Indigenous youth


